Firstly, we are humbled that Kingi Tūheitia is patron of Te Tohu Taakaro o Aotearoa a position held by his late mother Te Arikinui Te Atairangikaahu.

I also want to acknowledge Te Tohu Taakaro o Aotearoa for their huge contribution in showcasing and celebrating Māori sporting prowess. Since 1991 Te Tohu Tākaro o Aotearoa has celebrated the sporting achievements of Māori by providing a platform to acknowledge this success.

The Māori contribution to our healthy and proud sporting nation is enormous - as was highlighted by the 2007 National Māori Sports Awards. Wayne (Buck) Shelford, Waimarama Taumaunu and Wynton Rufer were inductees to the Māori Sports Hall of Fame and a special award was given to Stacey Jones.

To all the recipients of the awards I congratulate you for your sporting achievements and success. In particular I want to acknowledge those Māori who in 2007 became national champions or world champions like Jason Wynyard (Ngāti Maniapoto, Ngāpuhi) who won the World 15" Standing Block and Single Saw title in Sydney and then went on to America to add three lumberjack titles to his trophy cabinet. I also want to acknowledge fourteen-year-old Larissa Eruera (Ngāpuhi) who in 2007 was the youngest ever golfer to win the New Zealand Women's Golf Championship.

Māori were also involved in the 2007 America's Cup. Dean Phipps (Ngāi Tahu) a three time winner of the America's Cup onboard Alinghi was joined by Matt Mitchell (Ngāi Tahu), Hamish Ross (Ngāpuhi) and Brendan Simmons (Ngāi Tahu).

Māoridom is blessed with a high calibre of fantastic sporting role models who inspire our rangatahi to strive for excellence in their chosen fields of sports. In realising Māori potential through sports Te Tohu Taakaro o Aotearoa in partnership with Te Puni Kōkiri are ensuring Māori are succeeding as Māori. I say that with the utmost pride as Te Puni Kōkiri have been supporting this kaupapa since its inception 17 years ago.

Finally, I want to acknowledge the late founder Albie Pryor, Te Arikinui Dame Te Atairangikaahu and kaumātua Sir John Turei who I am sure would be extremely proud of the sporting legacy they have left to us all.

I look forward to seeing you all in Rotorua this year in anticipation of the stellar line-up of Māori sportspeople as we head towards our 20th Celebration in 2010.

# Event Venues

## Rotorua

Since 2000 Rotorua's venues have been under the management of a central structure – the "Event Venues Rotorua" brand, operating out of the Rotorua Convention Centre building. Event Venues Rotorua is a business unit of the Rotorua District Council directly managing six venues within Rotorua and providing a range of event related services.

Rotorua's \$28m Energy Events Centre is located in spectacular Government Gardens, immediately behind the iconic Bath House building housing the city's Museum of Art and History. It is a project of the Rotorua District Council with significant funding support from Rotorua Energy Charitable Trust and a range of visionary commercial and philanthropic partners.

The Energy Events Centre is a purpose-built events complex incorporating the Southern Trust Sportsdrome, BayTrust Forum, Unison Arena, Wai Ora Spa Grand Hall, and a number of breakout rooms. It is just a few minutes walk from its sister facility, the Rotorua Convention Centre, and from major hotels, cafes and restaurants.

Storm was shocked at the recent Māori sports awards upon receiving the "Albie Pryor Memorial Trophy" in fact he had not considered the possibility, no speech had even been planned.

In Storm's own words "It totally blew me away. The pride and Mana I felt that evening was overwhelming".

U/23 World Champion Storm is currently one of the World's top lightweight scullers. He won bronze in the U/23 World Championships in 2005, won gold in 2006 – and repeated that in 2007.

### 'Beijing Olympics 2008'

Storm Uru has been named in the men's lightweight double sculls with Peter Taylor for the final qualification regatta in Poznan in Poland.

Prior to Poland, Storm and Peter will compete in two world cup regattas at Munich and Lucerne.

Storm and Peter have to come first or second in Poland to qualify for Beijing, the competition at this regatta will be tough against strong rowing Nations from Poland, USA, Russia, Belgium and Czechoslovakia.

## A ngai Māori hākinakina kaihoe

One of the outstanding Māori athletes of the 1930's was **John (Jack) Hoani MacDonald** (Rangitane). A member of the Wairau and Picton Rowing Clubs, he achieved gold as a member of the rowing 'fours team' and silver as a member of the rowing 'eights team' at the 1930 Ontario Empire Games. He went on to be the New Zealand flag bearer and a member of the 'eights' finishing fourth at the 1932 Los Angeles Olympics.

John was a Māori All Black in 1926, 31, 34, 35, and a Marlborough, Manawhenua and South Island rugby representative. He played professional rugby league in England in 1936, 37, 38, and was selected in the World Rugby League Team in 1937 and 1938. In 1942 he became the only Māori to represent England at rugby in a match against Wales. John also played rugby for the NZ Services and represented the NZ Services in Tennis at Wimbledon.

### Maori Representation

Māori have represented NZ and achieved many NZ rowing titles, but sadly, recording of Māori participation in the sport of rowing is limited. We would be delighted if this article awakened the minds and that you can reveal that history and memorabilia with us in order to collate and record this much needed narration.
