This year's 32nd Māori Sports Awards acknowledges our outstanding Māori sports women and men for their exceptional achievements made over the past year.

Our Māori sports women are dominating across all open categories this year being 11 of the 14 named finalists. This includes all of our umpire/referee finalists, and three of the four Māori Sports Team finalists.

Our Black Ferns Sevens result at the Tokyo Olympics is a standout example, as well as the accomplishments of Dame Lisa Carrington. Sixty-seven Māori sports women, men and officials represented Aotearoa New Zealand at the 2022 Birmingham Commonwealth Games, who were instrumental in attaining our second highest medal haul. The Waka Ama Worlds held in the United Kingdom and the Women's Rugby World Cup were two most recent world events that showcased the talents of our Māori sportspeople.

The 2022 finalists have attained great achievements as a result of many hours, months, and years of disciplined dedication to their chosen sport, and due to the help, knowledge and skills provided by those who support them.

Storm was part of the Hyundai Pinnacle Programme's first intake back in 2004. Hailing from Invercargill, Storm competed for the NZ Rowing team at two Olympic Games and achieved a bronze medal at the 2012 London Olympics in the men's lightweight double.

The three-time world champion retired from rowing in 2012 and attended Oxford University in 2013 before gaining a job in finance in London. Storm now works for Liontrust Asset Management as Co-head of the Global Innovation team and manages over \$1bn in assets.






